## Faculty and Mentors

**Erik Carter** is Associate Professor of Special Education at Vanderbilt University and Investigator at the Vanderbilt Kennedy Center of Excellence in Developmental Disabilities. His research and teaching focuses on strategies for supporting meaningful inclusion for children and adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities. He has written four books, among them *Including People with Disabilities in Faith Communities: A Guide for Service Providers, Families, and Congregations*. Erik and his family have been parts of several different Protestant congregations.

**Debbie Creamer** is Associate Dean for Academic Affairs, Director of Distributed Learning, and Director of Library and Information Services for the Iliff School of Theology in Denver, CO. In addition to teaching courses on disability and religion, her interests also include contextual theologies, feminist theory, leadership development, and pedagogy. She is author of *Disability and Christian Theology: Embodied Limits and Constructive Possibilities* (Oxford University Press, 2009) and past chair of the Religion and Disability Studies Group of the AAR. Debbie is United Methodist.

**Bill Gaventa** serves as Director of Community and Congregational Supports at the Elizabeth M. Boggs Center on Developmental Disabilities, and Associate Professor, UMDNJ-Robert Wood Johnson Medical School. Bill works on community supports, training for community services staff, supervision of a Clinical Pastoral Education Program, and the Faith Community Leadership Program of the PA Council on Developmental Disabilities. Bill is American Baptist.

**Tom Graves** is President Emeritus of Baptist Theological Seminary of Richmond. With degrees from Vanderbilt, Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, and Yale, he served as a church pastor for almost twenty years before moving into seminary teaching and administration. He was Chair of the Task Force on Disability and Seminary Education, Association of Theological Schools, 2007-2008 which led to the first ATS policy on disability. He lives in Richmond, Virginia.

**Leonard M. Hummel** is Associate Professor of Pastoral Theology and Care and Director of Clinical Pastoral Education at Gettysburg Seminary. He studied at Haverford College, Yale Divinity School, Luther Seminary, and has his Ph.D. from Boston University. Among his writings is the Fortress Press book: *Clothed in Nothingness: Consolation for Suffering*. Leonard is Lutheran.

**Samuel Kabue** is the Executive Secretary of Ecumenical Disability Advocates Network (EDAN) of the World Council of Churches. He holds Masters degrees in Education and in Special Education, is undertaking a Master of Theology at St. Paul's University of Kenya, and was honored with a Doctor of Divinity degree by Serampore University in India. He was first a teacher, then Director of the Program for Persons with Disabilities of the National Council of Churches of Kenya before helping to found EDAN. EDAN has been engaged in working with theological institutions and associations around the world to introduce disability studies and discourse. Sam is Presbyterian.

**Candida Moss**, originally from the United Kingdom, is Assistant Professor of Theology and Assistant Director of the Disability Studies Forum at the University of Notre Dame. She holds an undergraduate degree in Theology from Oxford University and an MA and PH.D. from Yale University. Her work concerns understanding suffering in the New Testament and early church, including published articles on the construction of disability, disease, and "deformity." Candida is Roman Catholic.

Professor **Hans S. Reinders** has taught ethics at the Vrije Universiteit in Amsterdam since 1995. He has published widely on disability issues in both secular and theological circles. Among his books are *The Future of the Disabled in Liberal Society* (The University of Notre Dame Press, 2000) and *Receiving the Gift of Friendship* (Eerdmans Publishing Company, 2008). He is currently serving as the Editor of the Journal of Religion, Disability and Health. Hans is from the Reformed Church tradition.

**Thomas E. Reynolds** is Associate Professor of Theology at Emmanuel College, of Victoria University in the University of Toronto. Committed to an interdisciplinary and relational vision of theology, Reynolds' teaching and research explore a range of topics related to Christian engagements with diversity in a global context. Among his writings are *The Broken Whole: Philosophical Steps Toward a Theology of Global Solidarity* (SUNY Press, 2005); and *Vulnerable Communion: A Theology of Disability and Hospitality*. He is member of a United Church in Toronto.

**Jeremy Schipper** (Ph.D., Princeton Theological Seminary) is an Assistant Professor of Religion (Hebrew Bible) and an affiliated faculty member of the Institute on Disabilities at Temple University, Philadelphia, PA. His research focuses on the Former Prophets (Joshua – 2 Kings) and disability in the Hebrew Bible and other ancient Near Eastern texts. Among his writings are *Thisabled Body: Rethinking Disability and Biblical Studies*, co-edited with Hector Avalos and Sarah Melcher, *Semeia Studies 55* (Atlanta: Society of Biblical Literature, 2007).

**John Swinton** holds the chair in Practical Theology and Pastoral Care at the University of Aberdeen, Scotland, United Kingdom. He worked for over a decade as a registered nurse in psychiatric and intellectual disability settings before becoming an ordained minister of the Presbyterian Church of Scotland and then a Ph.D and professor. Writings include *Resurrecting the Person: Friendship and the Care of People with Mental Health Problems*, and *Critical Reflections on Stanley Hauerwas' Essays on Disability: Disabling Society, Enabling Theology* New York: Haworth Press (2005). In 2004 he founded the *Centre for Spirituality, Health and Disability* at the University of Aberdeen. [www.abdn.ac.uk/cshad](http://www.abdn.ac.uk/cshad).
